
## **Speech Comprehension Questions**

- 4) Is this speech Truth's summarization of the time period or a critique on it? How do you know?
- 5) Throughout this speech, Sojourner Truth repeats the phrase "Ain't I a woman?" Why do you think she chooses to repeat this?
- 6) What do you believe Truth's claim is in this speech? Where and how does she acknowledge and refute the counterclaim?
- 7) At the end of the speech, Truth says, "Then that little man in black there, he says women can't have as much rights as men, 'cause Christ wasn't a woman! Where did your Christ come from? Where did your Christ come from? From God and a woman! Man had nothing to do with Him." What does she mean by this?
- 8) Truth poses the question, "What does intellect have to do with women's rights or Negros' rights?". Discuss why she even brings up intellect, and then answer her question.
